

Consonant Sound /j/ spelled “ge”

Students could be taught that the letter “g” represents the /j/ sound *only* in front of the letters “e,” “i” or “y” but that there are exceptions where it represents the /g/ sound. All words on this list fit the rule because **ge** is a digraph here.
